Reports:

President's Report:

- The year 2023 marked the 98th year of operation of the Glebe House Museum and Getrude Jekyll Garden as a non-profit organization.
- Mission goals included lectures, tours, programs, and special events.
- The Glebe House Museum and Getrude Jekyll Garden has a strong presence in the community and continues to work on developing a stronger presence outside of the community.
- Social media management by Director LoriAnn Witte has resulted in a broader range of visitors.
- Use of technology has also resulted in greater efficiency and ease in scheduling volunteers, buying tickets for events, and making online donations.
- There were revenue increases in the areas of donations, grants, and investment income.
- The year ended in the black.
- Thank you LoriAnn for applying for grants even during the busiest time of year, October.
- Big projects
 - Museum Makeover Project
 - Information panels, stanchions, and security cameras are now on the first floor of the Glebe House.
 - Visitors will now be able to take self-guided tours on the first floor of the house when a docent is not on duty.

- LoriAnn and Registrar Lois Zane worked extremely hard on the Museum Makeover, including writing 15 drafts of the information found on the panels. A big thank you goes out to both LoriAnn and Lois for making the story of the Glebe House more accessible to visitors.
- Inventory digitization project
 - Lois worked with two summer interns, AnnaRose Goldwitz and Charlotte Smith, on digitizing her notes.
 - This project is ongoing.
- Cheers to 100 Years!
 - This fundraising event will be held in June, 2025.
 - A special committee has already been working on the planning for this event.

- Marshall Children after school program shows children how to become junior docents
- Week long summer program providing hands-on experiences was especially engaging and well received.

- Mindy will continue to have a role at the Glebe House, as she is just stepping back.
 She is part of the fabric of the Glebe House.

Director's Report:

- The season began with renewed hope, enthusiasm, and an understanding of how to adapt to changes.
- There was a shared outlook that things will be better and that possibilities will be made into realities.
- The Calendar of Activity in the annual report shows what has been happening throughout the year.

Visitation

- Visitation rose by 20%.
- There were more than 1700 visitors (that could be counted).
- Activities, special tours, and garden clubs increased.

- o CT Kids Free summer program contributed to the increase in visitors.
- Numbers for the regular season, May to October, decreased due in large part to extensive rain and/or heat, especially during weekends in June and July.

Demographics

- o In the past visitors were usually in the over 64 age group.
- o In 2023 there was an even split for visitors age 18-64 and those over 64.
- o 72% of visitors were from CT.
- There were not as many out of state visitors this year.
- Wine, Cheese and Art Please! attracted a new audience.
- The afternoon tea was moved from summer to December, drawing a lot of people who had not been to tea events before. Thank you to those who donated tea and food for this event.

Networking

- LoriAnn is proud of the networking that is done on behalf of The Glebe House
 Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden.
- It is important for the community to see members of The Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden at community events.
- Networking provides us with a positive image.
- O Networking enables us to ask for things when they are needed.
- o Participation in the CT Historic Gardens gives us a large boost in visibility.
- Networking and participation are also done with the Arts Alliance of Woodbury,
 Flanders Nature Center, and the Woodbury CT Chamber of Commerce.

Museum Makeover Project

- o The Museum Makeover Project has been completed.
- The project ran from April until September.
- The Museum Makeover will enable visitors to take self-guided tours of the first floor of the house when a docent is not on duty.
- Information panels have been installed on the first floor of the Glebe House.
- The panels include important information about the Marshall family, the rooms, and the architecture of the house. Panels also include information on the formation of the Episcopal church.
- A panel on the outside of the house includes information and a QR code which will encourage visitors to come back to the Glebe House if they come when the museum is not open.
- Many thanks go to Lois Zane for her help with the Museum Makeover, especially her help with the writing of the 15 drafts to get the panels to their final stage.
- Conservation Connection administered the grant for the Museum Makeover.
 Kathy Varda is the head of Conservation Connection who promoted this project.
- o Barbara Bradbury Pape worked on the project as a consultant.

- CT Humanities and CT League of History Organizations also helped with the project.
- The Museum Makeover was a great project and a great learning experience.
- Feedback has been good.

President's Annual Report 2024

The year 2024 concluded the 99th year of operation for the Glebe House Museum and marked the gateway to the museum's historic 100th anniversary. Significant objectives of the organization were accomplished which will allow the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden to prevail into a new century with sustained vigor and prominence within the community. The organization once again achieved its largest goal, which is the fulfillment of its mission to provide outstanding and engaging educational and cultural opportunities, lectures, programs, tours and special events for visitors of all ages.

Of the many significant achievements in 2024, two are most noteworthy:

The official donation and transfer of ownership via quit claim deed of the museum building and triangle properties to the Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc., for which we are profoundly grateful to the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, The Rt. Rev. Jeffrey W. Mello, board member Rev. Tuesday Rupp, and Bradford Babbitt for their contributions to the process. We also acknowledge the generosity of Attorney Francis Donnarumma for his pro bono work pertaining to this transfer as well as board members Andy Ward and Guy Gabrielson for covering any remaining associated expenses.

The replacement of museum, cottage and garage roofs, for which we are immensely appreciative to the Gabrielson Family Charitable Fund, the board of directors for the Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc., Hydar Construction, Inc., and the many individual donors who made this project possible.

Revenue increases in many areas were noted in 2024, including donations (both restricted and unrestricted) along with investment income. It was a banner fiscal year for the organization.

Prior to the museum and garden's opening day on May 10th, the early months of 2024 were notably busy. In March, board members of the Seabury Society attended a productive and enjoyable day long retreat at Camp Washington Episcopal Camp and Retreat Center in Lakeside, CT and we are very appreciative to board member, Tuesday Rupp, for facilitating and leading this enlightening experience.

In April, a successful "Puttin' on the Roof" fundraiser was held at the 1754 House. The event was a sellout, with its speak easy themed party as a prelude to the museum's roaring 20's themed anniversary gala scheduled for June 2025. We are grateful to all who attended and contributed to this crucial fundraiser, and to the 1754 House for working with us to make this possible.

The 100 year anniversary celebration committee (established in 2023) met regularly throughout the year planning for the "Cheers to 100 Years" fundraiser to be held in June 2025. Special thanks to Joanne Bauer, Carol Ziske, Eric Groody, Janet Serra and LoriAnn Witte for their efforts on this major event.

Once the museum doors opened for the season, the property saw a steady flow of visitors, including bus tours and a family reunion. 2024 was the first full year of the museum's optional self guided tour for visitors, which has thus far been very well received. Work on the museum roof commenced during the summer season, occasionally impacting the ability to receive visitors, but well worth the temporary inconvenience. Roof work was completed prior to the major "All Hollow's Eve" fundraiser taking place on the last two Saturdays of October. Always a

popular event within the community, this year's entertainment once again included a tour through the luminary lit trail of Woodbury's Old Burying Ground on the first Saturday, and a theatrical performance by "The Witches of Woodbury" on the second Saturday. The "haunted" museum designed by board member, Mindy Belcher, was open both evenings entertaining guests with a combination of factual history combined with unsettling urban legends of Woodbury. We thank the many volunteers who dedicate their time to make this fundraising event possible and are grateful to Newtown Savings Bank for sponsoring this event. In December, the museum hosted a lively and well attended holiday party. Guests were treated to traditional wassail, wine, tempting hors d'oevres, and a caroling sing along.

The Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden continued to maintain a strong presence at numerous events within the community including Earth Day, the Arts Association of Woodbury art strolls, the Green Corn Festival, and the highly attended Woodbury Fall Festival

As always, educational opportunities for children remain a focus of the Glebe House Museum. Director LoriAnn Witte continues to adapt programming in both the Marshall Children after school program as well as the summer camp experiences, in order to attract participants and maintain enrollment. We are very grateful to lon Bank for for their contribution toward the summer experience and to help provide scholarships for children in need.

The Property Committee comprised of Hugh Sullivan, Guy Gabrielson Carter Booth and Lois Zane continued its ongoing dedication to overseeing the maintenance and preservation of the buildings and grounds. This year's capital improvement project of replacing the roofs of all three buildings was a major undertaking, and we are grateful to this capable committee, especially Guy Garbrielson for coordinating the project with Hydar Constructruction, Inc.. Several smaller projects and repairs took place throughout the year, most notable the driveway repair completed with new crushed stone donated by O&G Industries and spread by volunteer Bob Bouclier, and the new garden tool storage area at the back of the garage. We remain grateful to our anonymous supporter who continues to provide care and maintenance for the triangle and east field properties.

The Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc. is pleased to welcome John Boyer to the board of directors. We look forward to John's service and contributions to the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden.

The Gertrude Jekyll Garden continues to be an increasingly popular destination for visitors from far and wide. The third season of the five year restoration project has been completed, and we are extremely grateful for the generous (anonymous) gift which has made this possible. We are grateful to Eileen Denver, Priscilla Price and Deb Soresino for their continued devotion to the historic garden with special thanks to Priscilla Price for acting as board liaison to the garden committee.

We remain enormously grateful to the Friends of the Glebe House, the dedicated volunteers who make it possible for the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden to fulfill its mission. The friends perform vital roles such as staffing the museum, assisting with special events, and providing support to the museum's director, all of which are imperative to the success of the organization. Each volunteer brings with them their special gifts and talents which contribute to the extraordinary offerings of the museum and garden.

We are thankful for the ongoing dedication of Lois Zane, Registrar of Museum Collections, who great knowledge, care and commitment are evident daily.

The board is exceptionally grateful for the work of devoted Director, LoriAnn Witte. LoriAnn's wide range of abilities and commitment to excellence combined with her affable nature make her an incredible asset to the organization. Whether on the museum property or off site at community functions, LoriAnn represents true commitment to the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden.



Director's Annual Report 2024

The 2024 season began with a renewed sense of hope and enthusiasm, despite the challenge of a major fundraising campaign on the horizon. Our team was committed to achieving our goals and continuing our mission of preservation and education. As I look back, I am incredibly proud of the success of our 99th season, which was made possible by the overwhelming support of our community for our fundraising efforts. These efforts were essential in securing the much-needed roof replacements on all three of our buildings, ensuring the continued preservation of our site.

Visitation

The Museum Makeover's self-guided visitor tour of the Glebe House main floor was well-received by the public in its first full season, especially during open houses and when guided tours were not available. The museum panels were not only used by visitors for self-guided tours but were also integrated into guided tours by many docents, showing their willingness to adapt and enhance the visitor experience.

Despite a decline in regular season visitors due to construction and summer weather, the Museum's special events boosted overall participation and revenue in 2024. Fundraising efforts also surpassed targets, leaving me humbled by the support that we received from so many members of our community.

Community Participation

I am proud of our active participation and networking efforts with local organizations such as the Woodbury CT Chamber of Commerce, Arts Alliance of Woodbury, Flanders Nature Center, The Institute for American Indian Studies and CT Historic Gardens. By representing our community and contributing to the resident's quality of life, we are fostering a collaborative spirit and demonstrating our positive impact.

Quit Claim

The long-awaited transfer of the Glebe House and Triangle properties to the Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc. (SSPGH) by the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) was finalized. This transfer empowers the Seabury Society to pursue a broader range of previously unavailable funding opportunities.

Given the Seabury Society's responsibility for the care and maintenance of the historic Glebe House and its surrounding properties, this transfer has always been a logical step. With the assistance of Bishop Jeffrey Mello, Rev. Tuesday Rupp, and ECCT Attorney Brad Babbitt, the Episcopal Church in CT approved a Quit Claim in March. We extend our gratitude to the Board of Directors of the SSPGH for their generous donation of the legal fees associated with the transfer, Attorney Fran Donnarumma for his legal assistance, and the ECCT for their willingness to donate the properties and their confidence in the SSPGH's stewardship of this historic gem.

1772 Foundation Grant and Roof Replacement

The property transfer enabled the Seabury Society to secure a \$10,000 grant from the 1772 Foundation, administered by Preservation Connecticut, for the Glebe House Museum roof replacement. A generous donation from the Gabrielson Family established a matching goal of \$35,000. A 1920s-themed fundraiser at the 1754 House Inn and Restaurant provided an ideal venue for the event.

Thanks to the community's support, the matching funds were raised, allowing for the re-roofing of all three buildings. This investment safeguards the historic house from the elements for many years to come. Hydar Construction, Inc. completed the project, and we express our gratitude to Fred Hydar for his generosity, professionalism, and the quality of his work. We are confident that the next phase of preservation will be completed by the close of 2026 as the Glebe House Museum enters its next century.

Gertrude Jekyll Garden Restoration

The third year of the five-year Gertrude Jekyll Garden restoration continued despite challenges posed by construction materials, limited access, and extreme summer weather. Dry conditions, an inefficient watering system, and weeds kept the Garden Committee busy. Their passion and dedication are commendable. The Jekyll Garden acknowledges the funding support of an anonymous donor, our "Garden Angel."

Education Programs

The Marshall Children's program experienced growth in both participation and revenue, retaining existing children and families while attracting new ones. Older children who have aged out of the program continue to volunteer for special events and as youth leaders for the summer program, a testament to the program's strength and the power of our story.

Grants & Sponsorships

We received grants that helped fund programs and events:1772 Foundation/Preservation Connecticut, Ion Bank Foundation, the Gabrielson Family Charitable Fund, the Diebold Family, Newtown Savings Bank, The Order of Colonial Lords of Manors in America, Conservation ConneCTion/CT Humanities, The 1754 House Inn & Restaurant, and the Woodbury Women's Club. We are also grateful for the support of the many private, individual donors who allow us to pursue our goals and achieve our Mission.

Retirement

Two longtime volunteers retired early in the year. Board Member Jim Frey concluded his final term of service with the same quiet and thoughtful approach that characterized his years of Board service. He consistently prioritized the organization's best interests in his decision-making. His friendly presence at our garden parties, his ability to engage guests, and his passion for the Glebe House will be missed. While we miss seeing him at the Glebe House, we know he's nearby at the vineyard, enjoying a glass of Gertrude's Garden.

In Memorium

Bonnie Bradley retired after more than 20 years as a Docent to be closer to family in Tennessee. Sadly, we were informed of Bonnie's passing as this report was being prepared. She was one of the first volunteers I met when I arrived at the Glebe House nine years ago. Strong, direct, kind, and thoughtful, Bonnie loved history and historic architecture. She was proud of her knowledge of the Glebe House and her ability to connect with visitors. She often spoke of her historic home and her beloved cat. We are grateful for her many years of volunteer service and the memories she leaves behind.

Conclusion and Thanks

Despite challenges such as construction, visitor access and safety, extreme temperatures, storms, flooding, and drought, this year was also marked by success. The

Seabury Society achieved its most successful financial year in 28 years, with increases in donations, membership, and events and a broadened revenue stream. As we enter our 100th Anniversary Year, we are ready to celebrate a century of preservation and education and look ahead to the future.

Preserving and caring for a historic site is an ongoing process, and we are grateful for the support of Board Member Guy Gabrielson and the love and care he puts into the many needed repairs. We are also grateful for volunteer Bob Bouclier, who has lent his expertise, equipment, and many hours of labor to property care at our site. The Triangle and East Field properties have become beautiful additions to the Hollow due to the efforts of another wonderful donor from the community.

All of this would not have been possible without the incredible core of volunteers who give so much of their time and talents to keep this organization running. Volunteer recruitment efforts have brought many new faces to us and I am grateful for their support and friendship.

I thank our Board Members, led by acting President Mindy Belcher, for their dedication and unwavering support in keeping the Seabury Society and its mission of preserving and maintaining the Glebe House and Garden, moving forward for future generations. As Mindy continues the role of Board President, I am grateful for all of the time and effort that she has given to make this organization a success.

I am grateful for our "Friends of the Glebe": The Shopkeepers who greet our guests with enthusiasm and our Docents who continue to adjust to new procedures to share the story of the Glebe House and its inhabitants with our visitors.

I thank our Garden Volunteers, led by Eileen Denver, Priscilla Price, and Deb Soresino, who along with the help of the many volunteers, have worked tirelessly to make sure that Gertrude's vision comes alive in all its beauty.

I am most grateful to Lois Zane for her support as registrar and steward of the house & collection, but also for sharing her love of the Glebe's history, and most of all her friendship.

I am thankful for our relationship with The Episcopal Church in Connecticut, through the efforts of Rev. Tuesday Rupp and Bishop Jeffrey Mello, that has allowed us to continue our preservation of this historic site and the education of our shared history.

Thank you to all of our donors and friends who support us in so many ways. The love and care that you put into this historic site amazes me and makes me grateful to be a part of its history.

I look forward to the coming year as we prepare to celebrate our 100th Anniversary.

ANNUAL REPORT 2024

The Glebe House Museum & Gertrude Jekyll Garden began 2024 with a renewed sense of hope, supported by over 40 dedicated volunteers who played a vital role in presenting the house to the public, maintaining the garden, and ensuring the ongoing success of the organization. Monthly meetings for the "Friends of the Glebe" were held in person, with the option to attend virtually. The gardeners kicked off the spring season, meeting regularly to continue year three of the garden restoration. They also volunteered at the CT Flower Show in Hartford, staffing the CT Historic Gardens booth. In April, the "Friends" gathered for their regular monthly meeting, which included volunteer training and preparation for the upcoming season of house tours. The month ended with the "Friends" staffing our booth at Earth Day in Hollow Park, where garden volunteers also led a tour of the Jekyll Garden.

May marked the beginning of a new museum season, bringing with it various volunteer opportunities, such as guided tours of the museum and garden, group tours, Woodbury Arts Walk events, First Saturdays, and participation in the Memorial Day Parade. These activities continued throughout the season, with the museum open Friday through Sunday from May through the first weekend in October. Despite challenges like construction and extreme weather, our Docents and Shopkeepers successfully provided 194 guests with guided tours. We greatly appreciate their flexibility and support!

Throughout the 2024 season, the Friends contributed to numerous events and activities, including Puttin' on the Roof, Earth Day, Wine, CT Open House Day, CT Historic Gardens Day, Hands-on History Summer Programs, Marshall Children's After School Programs, All Hollow's Eve Cemetery Tours, The Witch of Woodbury & Friends, The Haunted Museum, An Old-Fashioned Wassail, and the Holiday Shoppe & Open House. They baked cookies for All Hollow's Eve, made and donated items for the Holiday Shoppe, and volunteered countless hours to staff these events. These activities would not have been possible without their dedication and support.

Eileen Denver, Deb Soresino, and Priscilla Price led our passionate gardeners, continuing the large-scale restoration of the Jekyll Garden with assistance from Still River Gardens and funding from a generous donor. They dedicated countless hours to enhancing the garden, transplanting plants, and relocating them to their intended spots or the growing garden. We are deeply grateful for their commitment.

Lois Zane was also a consistent presence at the museum, coming in nearly every day to care for the collection and assist the Director with special projects. We thank her for her unwavering dedication.

The Friends of the Glebe also enjoyed three field trips this year. On June 25th, they visited Harkness, where they toured the mansion and gardens and enjoyed a picnic. On July 25th, the group traveled to Roseland Cottage for a tour and picnic, and on September 10th, they visited the private gardens of Sylvia and Jay Abbott, Marshfield, in Litchfield. The season concluded with

the Valiant Volunteer Thank You Picnic, held on a beautiful September day with great attendance.

They played an essential role in bringing the Glebe House Museum & Gertrude Jekyll Garden to life for over 1,300 visitors this year. THE GERTRUDE JEKYLL GARDEN ANNUAL REPORT on 2024

The restoration of Gertrude Jekyll's garden at the Glebe House Museum continues, with its 100th anniversary in 2027! Making our work especially tricky last summer was the installation of a new roof for the Museum: trucks came and went, and piles of lumber adorned much of the North lawn and parts of the driveway for months. A bigger challenge was that, for many months, Connecticut (and the Northeast states in general) experienced a drought, and our team (mostly Ron Ragaini) had to do a lot of extra watering.

Our friendly gardening team is a bit bigger this year, and volunteers new and not-so-new talk about how much it means to them to restore the only Gertrude Jekyll garden in America open to the public. We continue to have the guidance of Still River Gardens, the crack team of Lori-Elizabeth and Jeremy Stickney. We are also delighted to have a new indoor storage area (LoriAnn's idea), which Bob Bouclier and Diana Anton fitted up for efficient use. Gardeners Doreen Nelson and Marcia DeBrock organized and planted the Fuchsia, which had been stored for us over the winter, an annual chore. Bob kept the borders edging look spruce and organized—a never-ending job.

Nothing stops weeds, even in a drought. Some weeds occur because there is I still quite a bit of open space between Gertrude's plants—it's all a work in progress, and weeding is the penalty.

We work every Monday and Wednesday morning, and sometimes on other days. Last year, because the heat was exceptional, we began work in the morning at 8 or even 7, often taking a break at the picnic table at to share garden plans and knowledge and to enjoy friendship.

We're proud that, with a lot of planning and effort, we have kept the Glebe House Museum's garden looking great. It's a show garden that continues to attract visitors who take tours and learn about Jekyll's mastery of garden design. We also enjoy giving tours to the many visitors who stop by as well as to the busloads of visitors we've hosted, sharing with them what we have learned about garden design, plant propagation, and garden maintenance. We especially welcome the friends and neighbors who come to the summer Wine and Roses event, and we enjoy using our beautiful garden to help connect the Woodbury community to the Glebe House and its Gertrude Jekyll Garden.

Registrars Report for Museum Collections Annual Report 2024

The Museum applied for and received a Collections Assessment Grant from Conservation ConneCTion, funded through a partnership grant between CT Humanities and the Connecticut Heritage Foundation of the Connecticut State Library. The site visit was completed on May 10 by Barbara Bradbury-Pape, Independent Museum Curator, and the final report was received on May 28, 2024. This report provides recommendations to improve collections care and storage which may be used to procure grants in the future.

In July, the Museum Collection received a small, 19th c Egg Basket from donor, Sandy Carlson. This basket was handed down through her family, originally belonging to her ancestor, Polly Isbell (1815-1897). Polly was married to Jared Isbell and they had a Tobacco Farm in the Hazel Plain district of Woodbury. Ms. Carlson also donated several other baskets filled with lace samples made by her Great-Grandmother and meant to be used for education.

Director, LoriAnn Witte continued the photography and data entry into the Connecticut Collections (CTCo) collective access system. Lois Zane transcribed handwritten files to help facilitate their accurate entry to the online collections management system. There are currently 161 objects and 467 object representations in the Collective Access system.

Lois Zane continues to care for the museum and maintain all of the original records for the Collection. We are truly thankful for her contributions and love of our history!

The 2024 fiscal year marked the best performance as recorded in the organization's QuickBooks history of 28 years, with significant increases in revenue across multiple categories, strong community support, and continued fiscal responsibility. This report highlights the key financial achievements that contributed to this record-breaking year.

Key Financial Highlights:

• Total Income:

 SSPGH recorded a total income of \$185,189 for the fiscal year, representing a significant achievement in organizational growth and success.

Revenue Increases:

- Compared to 2023, the following categories saw notable revenue increases:
 - Membership
 - Special Tours
 - Marshall Children Education
 - **Events** These increases reflect the organization's ability to diversify its revenue streams and expand its offerings to the community.

• Donations:

- Through the generosity of many donors, SSPGH raised a total of:
 - **\$34,788** in **unrestricted donations**, providing essential flexibility in funding.
 - \$93,101 in **restricted donations**, securing funding for the roof replacement and the garden restoration.

• "Puttin' on the Roof" Event:

• The special "Puttin' on the Roof" fundraising event raised over \$17,000 for the roof replacement project, contributing to the success of this critical infrastructure investment.

• Operating Expenses:

o Operating expenses increased by less than \$700 compared to 2023, demonstrating SSPGH's commitment to maintaining a lean and efficient operation while supporting program growth.

• Utilities:

 SSPGH saw a marked decrease in heating costs following the switch from oil to propane in 2023. This change significantly contributed to cost savings in the utility category.

• Total Expenditures:

o Total expenditures increased by \$84,187, primarily driven by the roof replacement project. This investment is essential for maintaining the historic Glebe House and ensuring long-term sustainability.

The fiscal year 2024 was a historic year for the Glebe House Museum & Gertrude Jekyll Garden, with record income, increased revenues across multiple categories, and strong donor support. While operating expenses remained relatively stable, the organization made significant investments in infrastructure, particularly through the roof replacement project. The strategic shift to propane for heating costs has also proven to be a prudent financial decision, contributing to long-term savings.

Looking ahead, the SSPGH remains committed to financial prudence while expanding its impact in the community.

The Seabury Society gratefully acknowledges the contributions of many Private Donors, Foundations, Local Businesses, Board Members, Volunteers, Members, and Friends. It is with their help and generosity that we are able to preserve the historic Glebe House, restore the Jekyll Garden, and raise awareness of the Museum's historic contribution and educational role in the community.


